CELEBRATING E-WEEK IN FEBRUARY-ERIN STEEVER, PE

Free First Fridays – In collaboration with the Kirby Science and Discovery Center (KSDC) at the Washington Pavilion, in Sioux Falls, SD, SDES volunteers will celebrate Leonardo da Vinci with over 300 patrons through their "Engineering with Leo" experience. While most of his inventions never made it off the page he drew them on, we know that he was looking into the future at machines that would make work easier and life better for each of us! An engineer with SDES will walk the audience through their current day experiences in the field as an engineer, while other SDES volunteers will assist KSDC staff with multiple activity stations. Simple machines that make up a bucket-wheel excavator, skateboard, water lift and spring scale (wheel/axel), thread cutter (wedge), tape dispenser and da Vinci's catapult (levers/pulleys) to name a few will be discovered and incorporated into a Guessing Game. This event will take place on February 6, 2015 from 5:00 to 8:00 pm.

STEM Girls – Encouraging middle school girls to pursue STEM careers, our theme this year plays on Disney's latest animation, *Big Hero* 6. We'll be at three underserved middle schools in Sioux Falls, SD to build, test and re-design paper plate "Speed Racers" tying in with the with supersonic fast mag-lev bike that the female industrial technology and mechanical engineering student GoGo Tomago's character develops in the movie. We'll then move on to our main build with Baymax as the inspiration. Baymax is a home health aide robot and SDES volunteers will assist the girls in building a "junk drawer robot" using Popsicle sticks, syringes and pencil erasers to make a Hydraulic Gripper Robot. STEM Girls is part of an after-school program run through the Kirby Science and Discovery Center. SDES develops an engineering themed plan each February, walk the girls through our development as female engineers, and provide a pathway for the students to ask questions and see themselves in engineering career paths. Our Hydraulic Gripper Robot is being provided by the South Dakota State University Extension and 4-H STEM program. Inspiration for the "Speed Racer" is from <u>www.howtoons.com</u>. STEM Girls will take place February 17-19, 2015 from 3:45 to 5:00pm at George McGovern (Tuesday), Whittier (Wednesday), Edison (Thursday) Mid-dle Schools in Sioux Falls, SD.



Greetings & Salutations,

We, the Student Chapter of Engineers Without Borders at South Dakota State University (EWB-SDSU), are writing this letter to introduce our project and ask for your support. EWB-USA is a national nonprofit organization that supports community-driven development programs worldwide by collaborating with local partners to design and implement sustainable engineering projects. EWB-USA has 684 projects in 39 countries.


As the first and only EWB chapter in South Dakota, we are excited to keep partnering with Unidad Academica Campesina de Carmen Pampa (UAC-CP) in Bolivia, a Catholic university, established in 1991 to make higher education available to young people who do not have the opportunity due to unequal access to education.


The number of UAC-CP students significantly increased from 53 in 1994 to 700 as of today. The university has expanded to two campuses, Leahy (upper) and Manning (lower) campus. The area surrounding the lower campus has the community with about 200 residents and the high school with about 500 students.

During this expansive growth, the potable water systems have not been adequately considered. The potable water is taken from waterfall and had delivered to the university, community, and high school without any treatment. The students and community members boil water before consumption but have experienced with water-borne illnesses. EW8-SDSU initiated the water improvement project with UAC-CP in 2011 and made 5 trips so far. We successfully implemented the chlorinator for the upper campus in 2012. We are preparing for the 6th trip to install chlorinators for the lower campus, community, and high school.

In 2015, we will work on preliminary design of sand filtration systems and continue educating the UAC-CP students and community members about importance of water treatment.

Table 1 shows an estimate of our travel budget. We hope a group of 6 students along with professional mentor(s) to make a trip to UAC-CP for 10 days for the summer of 2015. It is the chapter's goal to raise enough funds to make the trip possible. Participating in a project like this as students will provide valuable experiences to gain perspective into real-world engineering design issues and to become responsible leaders.

Lunch Ethics Contest. Match your wits with experienced professional engineers and engineering students throughout the country!

WHAT IS TO BE DONE? NSPE's Board of Ethical Review is furnishing you with a *real* FACT situation regarding an engineer who is faced with the ethical question of whether his firm can perform services in connection with a site-development study for a county with which he is associated through his membership on a county industrial development agency. Given the FACTS, you are asked a QUESTION about the ethics of the engineer. Contestants are encouraged to read and discuss the FACTS of the case and answer to the QUESTION. Then contestants are to develop DISCUSSION AND CONCLUSIONS using the format of the NSPE Board of Ethical Review. Contestants are also to give REFERENCES eiting only specific sections of the NSPE *Code of Ethics for Engineers*. Other materials should not be cited. (A copy of the <u>NSPE Code</u> and a sample BER case (demonstrating the format) are attached for reference. Contestants may also want to check the following Web sites for additional cases decided by the BER: www.nspc.org and www.nice.org).

FACTS

A county Industrial Development Agency (IDA) and the county plan to jointly fund a site-development study for a proposed business/commerce park on two parcels behind the Mid-County Plaza. The county will take the lead on the project and contract with an engineering firm to perform the site-development study. The land is currently owned by XYZ Properties Inc. The IDA-County agreement stipulates that IDA and the county will each contribute \$50,000 for the project.

As project lead, the county is considering a proposal from ABC Engineering to perform services in connection with the project. Engineer A, an IDA board member and part owner of ABC Engineering, believes he has a conflict of interest due to IDA's involvement on the project and the fact that Engineer A's firm, ABC Engineering has previously done development work on the property for XYZ Properties. Engineer A indicates that since the county is the lead agency, he plans to recuse himself from discussions and decisions relating to the study. Engineer A also indicates that if IDA had been the lead agency, he would have resigned from the IDA. The county attorney indicates that since this is a contract between the county and the engineering firm, there is no need for Engineer A to resign.

Was Engineer A's decision to recuse himself from discussions and decisions relating to the jointly funded sitedevelopment study ethically sufficient under the circumstances?

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
